




Anti-Essays

Long ago, essays were the dominant form of media. Today, it's digital content. The needs of contemporary artists and communicators are different from those in the past, so English has transformed into a digital media course where students will learn to use modern technology to communicate with a global audience. Medical English 11 will explore topics such as storytelling, viral media, video production, and online publishing. Welcome to the end of High School English as you know it.



Project-Based Learning

This is not a lecture course. Students will have a hands-on opportunity to create digital media content using inquiry-based projects. Each project is driven by the interests and questions that students bring to them, acknowledging that every student has different learning needs and aspirations.



Maker Space

My classroom is loaded with creativity rocket-fuel. Students will have access to a wide range of construction tools and materials that allow them to transform ideas into reality. Students will learn to use different fabrication techniques and processes such as laser cutting, 3D scanning and printing, molding & casting, 3D modeling, as well as simple circuits and electronics. Students will have access to the tools and knowledge that allow them to "make almost anything" and share their creations with the world.



Technology

If you're ready to grab hold of technology and make it start working for you, you've come to the right place. Medical English 11 will amplify student voices by giving them hands-on opportunities to create and publish their work using iPads, apps, videos, blogs, webpages, and online speeches. Student work will be shown, shared, discovered, and discussed using social media, supplementing traditional written or performance publication.



Literacy

Few students read, and fewer read for pleasure. Medical English 11 will challenge the status quo by transforming students into daily readers. Students will select books they find interesting, read in a diversity of genres, and have authentic discussions about literature with peers. By the end of the year, students will have read at least 20 books and made a connection with literature they truly love.



Storytelling

To get a point across, the world is shifting from bullet points to storytelling. Students will learn to craft attention-grabbing narratives and inspire others to follow their message or cause, and connect with worldwide audiences. This focus will help students develop presentation literacy: the ability to communicate effectively with any audience. The communication skills gained will empower students to attack whatever career path they end up strolling down.

Zombie Survival Project

The Project: Imagine it's the near future. A Zombie virus spreads rapidly through our community, and decimates the global population. In a matter of days, civilization has crumbled and humanity has turned into ravenous, flesh-eating Zombies. A few lone survivors remain... we're trapped in our classroom as Zombies surround the school gates. How can we survive?

Driving Question: Can a class of high school students rebuild civilization in the wake of a Zombie Apocalypse?

The Process:

- Design survival solutions:
 - Water
 - o Food
 - Shelter
 - Utilities
 - Defenses
- Build, test, and re-build survival solutions.
- Communicate survival strategies to the public in a "DED Talk."



Video Smackdown Project

The Project: Save a life by creating a health-themed video campaign that will prevent unhealthy behaviors, attitudes, or lifestyles. Students will learn how to declare allegiance or opposition to a cause by creating a flawless video-based argument that champions an agenda or supports a clear point-of-view.

Driving Question: Can social media save a life?

The Process:

- Fall in love with a cause.
- Pick a side in the fight.
- Make a video argument.
- Post the video to YouTube.



Write Your Life

The Project: A routine writer's workshop allows students to reflect, meditate, experiment in new techniques, and become the authors of their life story.

Driving Question: What's your story?

The Process:

- Write every week.
- Peer review other's writing.
- Publish the best work.



Book Love

The Project: A daily reading habit allows students to develop a lifelong love for literature. Students will select books they find interesting, read in a diversity of genres, and have authentic discussions about literature with their peers.

Driving Question: How do you read for pleasure? **The Process:**

- Read every day.
- Fall in love with some books.



Viral Literature Project

The Project: Students will select books they enjoyed reading and advertise them to others in our community, either local or worldwide.

Driving Question: How can teens spread reading throughout our community?

The Process:

- Choose beloved books.
- Get others to read them.

4 FAQ

Answers to frequently asked questions.



Can I submit late work?

No. Late work is never accepted. Students who are absent must submit their work electronically through **Google Classroom** by the posted due date. I will never grant deadline extensions or make up work.



Can I be late to class?

No. Early is on time. Students will be marked late if they are not in their seat and prepared before the bell rings.



Can I eat in class?

No. Food is never allowed during class. Hydration, such as water, is allowed.



Can I use my cell phone?

No. Cell phones are never allowed during class. All personal electronic devices must be packed away and inaccessible for the entirety of our class session.



Can I use the restroom?

Yes. Every student is given two (2) restroom passes each semester. Use them for emergencies only.



Can I put my bag on the desk?

No. Bags/backpacks are never allowed on the desktops. Your desktop is for creating beautiful work and needs to be clear of obstructions and distractions.



Can I do work for other classes?

No. Work for other classes is never allowed.



When am I excused?

The bell does not excuse students. Mr. Miller will say the words "you are excused" allowing students to exit the classroom.



Can I take my final exam early?

No. Final exams will never be given early.



Do you offer extra credit?

Yes. Extra credit is earned by exhibiting positive classroom behavior. Students can track their behavior points using **ClassDojo** to view progress.
